

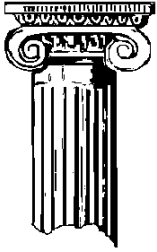

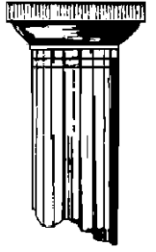

Infamous Freemasons

The Reverend William Dodds who was born in 1729, was the first Grand Chaplain of the Grand Lodge of England, in 1775. He delivered the oration at the dedication of Freemasons' Hall in London in 1776, and was the author of many books & papers including "Beauties of Shakespeare." However, weakness of character in money matters caused him to be tried for the crime of forgery in 1777, after he'd fraudulently signed the name of the Earl of Chesterfield, in the matter of £4,200. At his trial, he was convicted and sentenced to be executed.

The affair created great public commotion and 30,000 people signed petitions to the King, to commute the sentence. Unfortunately, all efforts failed [*it shows just how severe criminal law was at the time*] the sentence was carried out, in one of the last public hangings in England.

Not a good ending for a man of God and a Mason.

The second meeting of the newly formed group of lodges within the Province that meet on Thursdays took place on Thursday, 29th May, in the premises of one of their number, Lodge Thistle & Crown No.1167 in Neilston.

2034 – 709 Lodges?

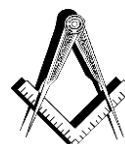
2044 – 567 Lodges?

The PGLRE 'New Members' seminar was held in the Masonic Temple here in Barrhead on the 23rd May.

A good attendance was treated to excellent presentations and the commissioned office bearers received many, and varied, questions.

Scotland recently created a "University Lodge". It is the St David Lodge No. 36 in Edinburgh and the aim is to attract younger members from the various universities in the city.



I was reading an article from another Masonic magazine which in turn took it's article from a morning paper where the Humanist Society are now claiming two million Scots no longer believe in God.

The article went on to ask that, if we only have a population of approximately five million how can freemasonry survive when our rules make it compulsory to believe in a Supreme Being?

The article finishes with saying that two million may not believe in God but that still leaves three Million who do.

Three things then popped into my head:

Firstly, approximately half of the three million are women.

Secondly, of the remaining one and a half million, many will be under 18 years of age or too old. So the reality is that we have a fairly small pool from which the above 993 Lodges can recruit from.

Finally, I have nothing with which to dispute the Humanist Society's figures but my personal feeling is that perhaps many of the initial two million still have faith in a Supreme Being but less in the established religions.

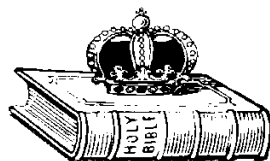

As the news of the War reached the people in the town of Barrhead, the feeling there, as with most of the country, was that it would be over quickly. Sadly the 'Over by Christmas' phrase was a myth. It was simply propaganda to help increase the number of volunteers. Men were encouraged to sign up and to ensure they could take part in the 'fun'.

In Barrhead, on 5th August 1914, the local Barrhead Territorials, 'G' company, 6th Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders, were mobilised. Eighty-four men under the command of Captain Hugh Locke prepared for duty. This was the start of the movement of men from the town to what was to become the Western Front. The picture is taken from the archives of East Renfrewshire Council. Sadly no names are available.

- Aug 7th** - French government awards King Albert of Belgium the Great Cross
- Aug 7th** - French troops under Gen Bonneau occupy Altkirch at Elzas
- Aug 7th** - German army occupies city of Liege, Belgium
- Aug 7th** - Lord Kitchener says "**Your country needs you**" poster spreads over UK
- Aug 7th** - Russia invades East Prussia
- Aug 8th** - 3rd pole expedition Ernest Shackleton "Endurance"
- Aug 8th** - French troops under Gen Bonneau occupy Mulhouse at Elzas
- Aug 8th** - Montenegro declares war on Germany
- Aug 9th** - German submarine U-15 sinks British cruiser
- Aug 10th** - At Liege, German 12"/16.5" guns reach Belgian boundary
- Aug 10th** - German battle cruiser Goeben reaches Dardanellen, Turkey joins Germany
- Aug 10th** - German troops reconquer Mulhouse in Elzas
- Aug 10th** - French fall back at Alsace
- Aug 11th** - France declares war on Austria-Hungary

Some Snippets from the Mallet of 32 Years Ago



Summer 1982

On Saturday 19th June, some 50 or so children were taken on the annual Childrens' Outing to Ayr. But little did they think, when they set off, of the difficulties they were to encounter. Halfway over Fenwick Moor the bus they were travelling in had a double puncture and to make matters worse the bus didn't carry a spare wheel.

Being miles away from anywhere it was impossible to find a phone (*Younger brethren should ask an older member about this phenomenon. Ed.*). It looked as if the day, which had been so eagerly looked forward to, was going to end up a disaster. However, as if in answer to a prayer, a luxury coach drew up and the driver asked what was wrong. 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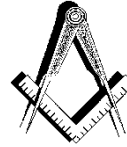

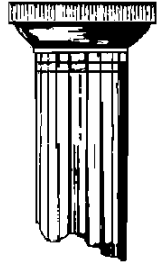
